## Rhiannon Clarke

Rhiannon is the fastest female para-athlete in Australia and proudly holds the Australian and Oceania records in the T38 100m, 200m, and 400m. A dual Paralympian and now World Champion, she is driven by her passion to advocate for equal opportunities and recognition for para-athletes — aiming to ensure their achievements are not just acknowledged but celebrated. Rhiannon strives to redefine perceptions of disability in sport and inspire the next generation to dream without limits.

Her athletics journey began in 2014 at a para "come-and-try" day, igniting a passion that has propelled her to extraordinary heights on the world stage. At just 15, Rhiannon became the youngest para-athlete from any nation to win a medal at the 2018 Commonwealth Games, claiming silver in the T38 100m. In 2019, she made history again as the first Australian female with cerebral palsy to break the 13-second barrier for the 100m.

Rhiannon has since represented Australia at the Tokyo 2020 and Paris 2024 Paralympic Games and has continued her rise through the global ranks. At the 2025 World Para Athletics Championships, she delivered strong performances making the finals of both the 100m and 400m T38 confirming her status among the world's elite sprinters.

Off the track, Rhiannon has been celebrated for her leadership and community impact. A finalist for the Western Australian of the Year (Youth Category) and recipient of the Australian Olympic Change-Maker Award, she continues to be a role model for inclusion and perseverance. Balancing her athletics career with her studies, Rhiannon is completing a Bachelor of Biological Science (Wildlife Conservation) at the University of Western Australia, combining her passion for sport and science to create a meaningful impact beyond the stadium.
